A number of children have been observed walking without obvious supervision across car parks. It is a busy time of the day; please remind your child of road safety when everyone is rushing around.

HARVEY ROAD: Consideration to our neighbours

A continual source of worry to me is the relationship that the school has with the residents of Harvey Road. Twice now, the gate padlock has been glued to prevent entry. This vandalism incurs additional school costs and due to safety risks, the incidents have been reported to the police. That these actions have been taken are very upsetting but also are the phone calls I receive from the residents informing me of cars parking over drives and, abusive responses from parents and family members dropping off and picking up from school. These behaviours are significantly impacting upon the relationship of the school in the community. All residents have been told to report number plates and car details to the police, following behaviour that is disrespectful and unpleasant and I whole heartedly support this. If a member of school staff observes such behaviour, our instruction is the same. This is not how we teach our children to be once they are through the doors of the school.

I would like to thank those parents who responded politely to the residents requests and are doing their upmost to show that disrespectful behaviour is not typical of the majority of parents in our school.

Home Alone? Your Guide to keeping your child safe

As a parent, caring for your child is your number one priority. But sometimes you might have to spend time away from your child, whether it's to go to work, go out for the evening or just to nip to the shops.

There is no legally set age at which it's OK to leave your child at home alone. It depends on whether yours is mature enough to cope in an emergency and feels happy about being left alone. Children mature at different ages and every child is an individual.

Your children rely on you to protect them and you are responsible for making sure they are happy and well looked after in your absence.

So, how can you tell if your child is mature enough? Is it ever safe to leave your young child alone? What are the dangers and risks of leaving your child alone at home?

We've collected the best advice from professionals, as well as some top tips from parents, to help you decide whether to leave your child at home alone and what you need to do if you are not there.

Remember:

- Never leave your baby or young child at home alone, not even for a few minutes, regardless of whether they are sleeping or awake. The risks and dangers are too great.
- If your child is under 12, they may not be mature enough to cope in an emergency. They should not be left alone for more than a very short time. And remember to put all obvious dangers out of reach before you go, such as medication, matches and sharp objects.
- Even when leaving older children alone, make sure that they are happy with the arrangement and that they know how to contact the emergency services. Keep your mobile phone with you and make sure they know your number so they can call you if needed.
- If your child is under the age of 16 they shouldn't be left alone overnight.
- Teach your child about what to do if there's a problem. Leave a list of people you trust that they could go to or could telephone, such as a neighbour or close relative.
